Hail him who saves you by his grace, **Commented [MKF1]:** This service intentionally focuses on all of the persons of the Trinity. While Pentecost generally focuses on the Holy Spirit's work on the day of Pentecost, this service attempts to connect the God of the Israel (Yahweh), with the work of Jesus and the Holy Spirit.

A key thread throughout this liturgy is the royalty, honor, glory and majesty of God and how that same power connects to us through Jesus and the Holy Spirit.

The service starts off with a High view of God, with such names as Yahweh and "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name" which can seem a little out of our reach but then it transitions to show that the Holy King/Queen comes to and for us so through the work of the Holy Spirit, we can now have that same power actively working in us. I envision it as if the King and Lord is coming. We recognize that Royalty is coming. Then the Royal one comes and we respond.

Commented [MKF5]: We ask the Holy Spirit to come and renew us; which one might expect in a Pentecost Sunday service.

Commented [MKF2]: This song is an uptempo praise song to draw people in. A praise song is used to help them not focus on their issues but on God. It serves as a musical Call to Worship, admonishing the people to clap their hands, shout with a voice of triumph and to praise the Lord.

Commented [MKF3]: Here the name Yahweh is used. We know that this is the Hebrew name for God and it was never voiced by Isrealites, however for the common lay member (in my context), they do not know this. For them, it is just another name. Thus, while this is a "High" name of God, it is also used here as a neutral name. If people do not have a connection or imagery associated with this name, then it could help them to have an unbiased, nonmale image of God. It is like saying Bless Benashe (made up name). I might know that this is referring to God but I do not have a picture to go with this name so it helps me to not limit God to one box, if that makes sense

Commented [MKF4]: Here we focus on the majesty, splendor and royalty of God.

Commented [MKF6]: This creates the image of royalty with the crown and falling prostrate before the King/Queen.

Commented [MKF7]: This connects us today with Israel and with Yahweh of the Hebrew Bible.

Commented [MKF9]: This song calls on the Holy Spirit, Lord, and God. This is a slow Contemporary Christian worship song. Again, this ties in with Pentecost. It is a continuation of the theme that the presence of God is welcome and sensed.

Commented [MKF8]: Now that the Lord has come, we respond by Blessing the Lord. This is a Gospel song to add a little variety in the worship as well. Whereas "All Hail the Power" is more majestic and lyrical, this is a simple song to enrich the worship experience.

Commented [MKF10]: Living God reminds us that our God is active in our lives not just a Being that was in the Bible but no longer moving our behalf today.

Responsive Scripture Reading (2 minutes) - Acts 2:1-8

Leader: Our responsive Scripture reading will come from Acts 2:1-8. Listen now for the Word of the Lord.

Message (20 mins)

All: Receive our offering God and use it for your glory. Amen

Commented [MKF11]: Here we go back to the "neutral" name God, understanding that it still might have male undertones for people.

Commented [MKF12]: This language works well with the royalty language used earlier.

Commented [MKF13]: The name Jehovah Jireh is used here with the offering to remind people that God will supply all of our people.
